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Dear Friends

The windows at Skinner Street are decorated with the theme 'The Passion, The Glory and The Hope. Each illustration accompanied with a passage from the Gospels.

The first five tell the story of the Passion and whilst looking into what we could do I read the account of Simon of Cyrene carrying the cross for Jesus. And although mentioned in three of the four Gospels (Matthew 27:32, Mark 15:21 and Luke 23:26) as the man ordered by the Roman soldiers to carry the cross not a lot is known about him.

Matthew only records his name and place of origin, Mark and Luke both say that he was "on his way in from the country". Mark also provides the information that he was "the father of Alexander and Rufus", men obviously well known to Mark's readers.

Cyrene was situated in modern-day Libya, on the northern coast of the African continent so this has led to speculation as to whether he was of African descent and colouring or if he was simply born there as were many others of Greek, Roman, and Jewish descent.

But really, I think his colouring or descent is unimportant, the fact that he was ordered to carry the cross and did not, as far as we are told volunteer.

We do not know of the burdens or struggles Simon had himself or if he was just another spectator in the crowd without a thought of getting involved by helping ease Christ's suffering.

It made me think of the times we are asked to carry someone's burden. We have seen them struggle but have needed that nudge to help. Sometimes it can make such a difference to their life.

It may not be easy or comfortable at first but once we are there, there's something in helping and giving our time to others that makes all the difference.

Simple things like just listening as they get something off their chest that has been worrying them for some time, doing their shopping, offering a lift to church or a hospital appointment.

So, no matter how uncomfortable it is sometimes or how far out of our comfort zone it's going to take us, maybe we should just do it. And do it without requiring thanks or recognition.

We help because we can and because Jesus told us whatever we do for others we do for Him.

Words from the Gospel of Matthew chapter 25: 31-40

³¹ "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his glorious throne. 32 All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. 33 He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. 34 "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. 35 For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, ³⁶ I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'37 "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? 38 When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? 39 When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' 40 "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

The month of April

April brings two dates that seem to stick' in our minds. All Fools Day on the 1st when we need to be on our guard and not be caught out by a simple prank and then towards the end of the month it is St. George's Day. In England we do not recognise our Patriot Saint as much as they do in Wales (St. David March 1st), Scotland (St. Andrew November 30th) and Ireland (St. Patrick March 17th)



But who was St. George, and what did he do to become England's Patron Saint? Very little is known about St. George's life, but it is thought he was a high-ranking officer in the Roman army who was killed in around AD 303. It seems that the Emperor Diocletian had St. George tortured to make him deny his faith in Christ. However, despite some of the most terrible torture even for that time, St George showed incredible courage and faith and was finally beheaded near Lydda in Palestine.

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His tomb can be found 25 miles Northwest of Jerusalem in the city of Lod. Stories of his strength and courage soon spread throughout Europe. The best-known story about St. George is his fight with a dragon, but it is highly unlikely that he ever fought a dragon, and even more unlikely that he ever visited England, however his name was known here as early as the eighth century. Unfortunately, the many legends connected with St. George's name are fictitious, and the slaying of the 'Dragon' was first credited to him in the 12th century. St. George, so the story goes, killed a dragon on the flat topped Dragon Hill in Uffington, Berkshire, and it is said that no grass grows where the dragon's blood trickled down! King Edward III made him the Patron Saint of England when he formed the Order of the Garter in St. George's name in 1350, and the cult of the Saint was further advanced by King Henry V, at the battle of Agincourt in northern France.

Shakespeare made sure that nobody would forget St. George, and has King Henry V finishing his pre-battle speech with the famous phrase, 'Cry God for Harry, England and St. George!'
