


Skinner Street United Reformed Church Poole February 2024

WEDNESDAY 14th FEBRUARY FIRST DAY OF LENT

Dear Friends.

February 2nd marks the Christian festival of Candlemas.

Although this is not something that is part of our own tradition I think it can, sometimes, be interesting and helpful to note the celebrations observed by other denominations which are part of the cycle of the Christian year. Candlemas marks the presentation of Jesus at the temple, and event recorded for us in Luke's Gospel (Ch2)

²² When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), ²⁴ and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.' [NRSVA]

There are several things that come to mind about this. Firstly Mary was steeped in her own, Jewish, religious tradition. Indeed it is easy to forget that Jesus was brought up in this context – something that we know he took seriously. Sometimes, when things are tough and we face challenges and doubts, it is the pattern of our religious habits that can carry us through to the next occasion when God reaches out to us and renews out realization that we are in God's care.

Secondly it emphasizes the temple as a focus for community as well as religious life. When I have visited Hindu temples in India I have been struck by the way that religious observance is a normal and everyday aspect of the lives of Hindus.

It is right that Sunday worship should be a special occasion that is prepared for and undertaken in a way that signifies the importance of gathering together in God's name. The many and varied things that take place in our church premises are, however, also opportunities to help people to engage with God.

Thirdly there is a mention of sacrificing doves. It is easy to judge practices in the past by standards of the present. What matters here is that there is a sense of giving something in response to God. The difference for us, after Martin Luther's theological discoveries that are the bedrock of our reformed tradition, is that our response is in the light of God's grace freely given.

Folk at Skinner Street have, and continue, to give to God in many & varied ways. The church is very much at the heart of its community and will continue, I am sure, to be a focus for the life of that community.

What is Lent? Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days.

Why 40 days? 40 is a significant number in Jewish-Christian scripture:

- In Genesis, the flood which destroyed the earth was brought about by 40 days and nights of rain.
- The Hebrews spent 40 years in the wilderness before reaching the land promised to them by God.
- Moses fasted for 40 days before receiving the ten commandments on Mount Sinai.
- Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness in preparation for his ministry.

Why is it called Lent? Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is observed in spring, when the days begin to get longer.

The colour purple: Purple is the symbolic colour used in some churches throughout Lent, for drapes and altar frontals.

Purple is used for two reasons: firstly because it is associated with mourning and so anticipates the pain and suffering of the crucifixion, and secondly because purple is the colour associated with royalty, and celebrates Christ's resurrection and sovereignty.

East and West: Both the eastern and western churches observe Lent but they count the 40 days differently.

The western church excludes Sundays whereas the eastern church includes them.

The churches also start Lent on different days.

Western churches start Lent on the 7th Wednesday before Easter Day (called Ash Wednesday).

Eastern churches start Lent on the Monday of the 7th week before Easter and end it on the Friday 9 days before Easter. Eastern churches call this period the 'Great Lent'.
