


# Skinner Street United Reformed Church Poole July 2024

#### **Dear Friends**

When I agreed to write for the July newsletter I had not anticipated that I would be doing so just after Mum's (Rev Barbara Meachin) funeral. Before I share some other thoughts with you I want to express my thanks on behalf of Dad (Rev Charles Meachin) and our wider family for the love and practical help that the church fellowship have given us. Your generous willingness is appreciated and helped us to celebrate her life as well as saying goodbye in a fitting way.

Since retiring from full time teaching I have been supply teaching at Poole Grammar School. This is great fun and means tackling a variety of subjects including RE. Alongside the usual questions about me being a scientist and a reverend (which surprisingly still causes a stir) there are precious opportunities to prompt young minds to think about big ideas including from where they get their moral and ethical direction. On a recent occasion I noticed a pupil reading the Communist Manifesto. I was familiar with this as it was set reading at missionary college because some missionaries were going to communist countries. It is not long and is well worth a read if only to illustrate how any ideology can become very different from the original ideas when tampered with by flawed human beings. I showed the boy Acts chapter 2 and, in particular, '44 Now all who believed were together, and had all things in common, 45 and sold their possessions and goods, and divided them among all, as anyone had need.' (NKJV).

He was impressed with the similarity of some of the ideas and I think this prompted him to think critically about both.

There are three thoughts that come to mind about this.

First is the value of constantly going back to the source material of our faith in scripture and, in particular, the New Testament and letting it challenge us.

Second is the danger of superimposing our own prejudices on the picture painted in scripture of the unconditional love of God.

And third is the fact that the early church quickly arrived at a policy of sharing resources and meeting need which we must always keep in mind and which I know the fellowship at Skinner Street has a track record of living out.

Skinner Street and all that it does is a sign of God's Kingdom in a community with both potential and need. Be encouraged by your continued presence in the heart of Poole.

Our thanks to a recent legacy and for the moment, I call it 'Peter's Portico'!

Other small upgrade work is being planned but we are applying to the Synod to support the more major jobs to keep our important Grade 11\* building in good order so our current use and future mission work within our local community can continue. We have been around in this building since 1777 (as a church since 1662 of course) and intend to celebrate 250 years in 2027 with a sound and well cared for place to use for worship and support our local community. We also have environmental improvements in our minds.
