The community garden has come on leaps and bounds in the last few



months. Spring has finally come and the tulips are out and what seeds we planted in the wind and cold and rain of March and put in our little greenhouse have begun to sprout and we have even planted the sweet peas and broad beans out in the raised beds! Life is returning and growing also for the first time in the garden.

As a group of people, we are also feeling like its spring. God has brought along new people - some new to faith, some without and some who have journeyed with the Lord for a while. We have taken to a pattern when we gather every other Sunday of an hour's gardening followed by an hour to share and chat over food and then we have time to pray together. We have been undertaking as a group a Lectio Divina each time we meet and as we settle together after food over coffee. This is such an approachable way to study the Bible together and to let God be God in inspiring our thoughts and sharing what from the passage we read together has stood out for us as individuals. This then leads into our time of prayer and it has felt very much the right way to bring in faith to this space and into this community as Lectio Divina can be done with someone who has never read the Bible or with someone who has read it daily for years. Children are also able to contribute and join in and this for me has been so important and underlines what someone I listened to the other day who leads small churches said, "there's no such thing as the junior Holy Spirit!". I love this as we as a group then are all equal and all able to receive and experience God as we are.

We have also been enjoying creating and using our prayer labyrinth which was built one Sunday very unexpectedly and with surprising ease. The younger members of the group have loved decorating stones which form the layout of the labyrinth and we have also been busy planting it up with rock plants, primroses and violas so it will eventually be a living labyrinth! God is so faithful and we continue to be surprised by His provision and the ease in which we grow and journey on as a group.

The title of this year's campaign is 'Pushing back against poverty'. The focus is on Aline Nibogora from Burundi. Married at an early age she had her first child at 14. A few years later, Aline faced even more devastation when her husband married another woman, forcing Aline to flee. He prevented her from taking their children with her, and in a further act of cruelty, told the local community that Aline was mentally ill and unable to care for her children.

Hungry, scorned and alone, Aline took her first step towards her new life. She started by participating in a transformative three-day community workshop, funded by Christian Aid. And was able, with the help of a small start-up loan to start a business trading avocados and peanuts locally. Once Aline secured a home for herself, her three eldest sons were able to escape their father and join her. They told Aline that their father had abused them and sent their three young siblings to live with different members of his family. Aline still hopes that she'll be reunited with her youngest children in time.


Today, Aline lives peacefully on her own plot of land in a remote village in the Kayogoro Commune in Makamba Province. She's baked her own bricks and is building a strong home for her and her children in every sense.

Now Aline can afford food, clothes and essential healthcare for her family. She's also purchased solar panels so her children can do their evening homework by electric light.

A daily devotional booklet is available on the table at the back of the church and Christian Ad envelopes will be in the pews from 5<sup>th</sup> May. With your gifts, prayers and action you could help someone like Aline to transform their own life. Tricia Knapp

#### SEVEN AMAZING BIBLE FACTS

- Over 100 million copies of the Bible are sold each year.
- In 1631, a publishing company published a Bible with the typo "Thou Shalt Commit Adultery." Only 9 of these Bibles, known as the "Sinners' Bible" exist today.
- The full Bible has been translated into 532 languages.
- The Bible informs the tradition of three major world religions: Christianity, Judaism, and Islam.
- The first authorized Bible printed in English is the Great Bible of 1539. King Henry VIII declared that it should be read aloud during the church services in the Church of England.
- The Bible has inspired more song lyrics than any other book, including "40" (U2), "Adam Raised a Cain," (Bruce Springsteen), "Adam's Apple" (Aerosmith), "Be Still" (Kelly Clarkson), "Blackened" (Metallica), "Cinnamon Girl" (Prince), "Come Sail Away (Styx), "Every Grain of Sand" (Bob Dylan), "I am God" (Kanye West) and many more.
- The world's smallest bible can fit on the tip of a pen. Scientists etched the 1.2 million letters of the Old Testament on a tiny silicone disk, which they call the Nano Bible."
